Roger's Report

Summer is nearly over, and with it Summer Club has drawn to a close heralding a return to our Club Night programme of talks, competitions, and members' evenings in the Bowls Club. The Summer Club outings were incredibly well supported with weekly challenges encouraging members to compete for a coveted Facebook Cover image so a very big thank you to each of the weekly organisers and to the members who made the evenings so successful and enjoyable. I am sure we will see many of the images again as competition images in the coming months. Summer Club has demonstrated a thirst for sharing ideas and turning what can be a very individual interest into an enjoyable group activity - the *raison d'être* of Club photography.

Over the past 18 months, we have all had to clip our wings, but with the vaccination programme having been so successful in protecting against serious illness, we can now be far more confident in returning to some semblance of normality. Your committee has reviewed the latest government guidance and, with some sensible measures to manage risk, is able to endorse a return to face-to-face Club Nights at the Bowls Club from Thursday 9th Sept. We are asking that members only attend the Bowls Club if fully vaccinated and free from any symptoms that may indicate active coronavirus infection. We will also ensure the room is well ventilated and will provide as much space as possible to allow some social distancing. Masks will not be required or mandated, but members who wish to wear one are, of course, free to do so. Personally, I cannot wait to return to the Bowls Club and am very

much looking forward to welcoming members back. We will look at experimenting with Zoom as a way of reaching out to presenters who are unable to attend in person, but in the interests of keeping Club Nights relevant do not intend to make Zoom attendance an option for members unless further covid restrictions are reintroduced.

In addition to the normal Thursday Club Nights, we will be restarting our programme of 'Back to Basics' sessions on the third Monday of each month. The emphasis for these sessions is to allow some smaller group activities often with a practical element that may be of greater interest to some than others. These may be 'basic' techniques for those new to photography, or more advanced topics for those with special interests. We intend to fit these sessions around members interests so if you have any suggestions on what you would like to see, or indeed present, please let me know.

Finally, although I am sure it will be highlighted elsewhere in this newsletter, please remember to enter your images (digital and/or prints) for our first Open competition no later than 9 Sep.

Week 15 – Light painting



Meet the members: Scott Antony

I retired in 2017 after a final incarnation as developer and administrator of a national training scheme for apprentice chefs "designed and delivered by chefs." Starting out, I trained at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and then 10 years as an actor across film, television, and the stage before that merged into the role of theatre director and then arts centre director, which is when I moved to Gloucester, eventually settling at Minchinhampton Common some 16 years ago. The arts centre role led in turn to arts development consultancy and planning, increasingly in the culinary arts before finally partnering with the British professional chefs' bodies to originate and establish the chef training scheme under the chairmanship Dame Prue Leith.



I joined our well-organised and friendly Club five years ago with my interest in photography burgeoning in step with the time available and having developed not only more chances for travel but also a particular enthusiasm for the storytelling potential of what I think of as photofilms (AV being such an indistinct term - pretty much all media is Audio-Visual these days). As photographers we're invariably commended for still photos that contain 'narrative' and my intent has been to achieve that end more explicitly through assembling more or many stills into a moving format that uses filmic tools - panning, zooming, transitions - under a varied timing that's carefully blended to music and/or voice. I hope the upcoming evening of October 14th, with a programme from myself and others in the Club, will demonstrate the worth and appeal and perhaps

encourage more members to experiment with the form. Yes, the preparation is time consuming when properly considered and addressed - rather than just fixed images timed to a piece of music - but really no more so than the copious hours many of us spend in post-processing single images and working with minutes rather than moments means the viewer's emotional range and involvement can be sustained.

Camera-wise, having worked up from the Lumix G1 mirrorless I'm very happy with the G9 for both quality and weight plus two dedicated Leica lenses from 12 - 60mm (24 - 120 equivalent) and 50 - 200 (100 - 400) along with Panasonic's own 30m macro; for general use I find I don't need more.

Question corner>>>

Q: What about white balance?

White balance is the basic colour "cast" or "temperature" of the image. This varies throughout the day based on the actual lighting conditions - you will all know how images are "warmer" and more orange when taken during golden hour or sunset.

A: The reason we adjust white balance is to get the colours in your images as accurate as possible (or to adjust them to personal taste for artistic reasons). Often the auto mode is good enough, but it can get it wrong.

You can set white balance manually, usually to:

- Tungsten - For indoor lighting, which cools down your photo.
- Fluorescent - For warming up your photo if under cool lighting.
- Cloudy - Tends to warm everything up.
- Flash - Warms up the cool light from your flash.
- Shade - This will warm things up slightly due to cooler light of the shade

If you post process, it is a straightforward method to colour correct your image so you can leave your camera on auto WB, but even then, sometimes it is more helpful to set a white balance to get consistency across a range of images. It can also be useful to set a white balance in complex lighting scenarios, and indeed you may even want to set a custom white balance here using a grey card. (A pre-printed image which is photographed and assigned to the camera as the "correct white")





Arsenal Smart Camera Assistant

A review by Roger Matthews

(Original no longer available but Arsenal 2 available shortly at c. \$199 - \$250).

Some of the newest high-end DSLRs have many ‘smart’ features but camera manufacturers have been slow to exploit some technologies that are now commonplace on phones. These effortlessly allow an in-built camera to be controlled by a variety of innovative apps that can automate a variety of functions in



a way that a few years back could only be achieved by professional post-processing of images. Arsenal Smart Camera Assistant is a device that was launched by a ‘kickstarter’ crowd-funded start-up in the US to bring a host of AI-powered smart features to almost any DSLR or mirrorless camera including ‘smart’ HDR, automated focus-stacking, time lapse and long-exposure photography plus wireless capabilities that allow control of your camera through your smart phone. But does the device live up to the hype for AI-powered ‘smart’ control?

Being a start-up, there were numerous delays in getting the product to market and the firmware required several updates to eliminate bugs. Each update needed to be uploaded before the device could be used - frustrating if your firmware had not been uploaded before attempting to use it! However, my experience has been generally positive. I have been pleased with the device’s handling of HDR images and the focus-stacking works well with no need to import separate images into post-processing software. My Canon does not have an intervalometer so I would not be able to capture time-lapses without one - although I have yet to use Arsenal for this, it appears to be easy to set-up and reviews have generally been positive. Most functions are only useful if you mount the device on a tripod, so this needs to be taken into consideration when looking at devices like this. The smartphone remote-shutter function works well and allows much more control over camera settings than a simple remote-control device.

If you have serious problems with Gear Acquisition Syndrome, this is a device that will get you excited, but there are flaws that limit its appeal. Having said that, the Arsenal 2 device (in development and already behind schedule because of chip shortages)

may be worth considering. This will be faster and offer new AI-powered features like ‘deep colour’, ‘crowd control’ (removing moving objects from a scene), ‘night assist’ and ‘panoramic stitching’. Time alone will tell whether this is a device just for the gear geek or a serious device to keep your old DSLR at the cutting edge.




