

Roger's Report

Competitions are an important part of the Club – minor changes to Group Structures

The ink had barely dried on my last report indicating confidence that we were moving forward with recovery from the pandemic before case numbers started rising again! However, as I write this we are again moving in the right direction, and we remain on course to restart our normal weekly Club Nights on 9th September. Your Committee will, of course, be keeping a close eye on public health guidance as that date approaches (and beyond) so we can continue to support members.

Competitions are an important part of the Club programme and allow members to receive feedback from independent judges - after overcoming my initial reluctance to 'be judged', I have found this aspect of club photography to be the best way to improve (both through feedback of my images and that given to other members' images).

We have operated a two-division structure with an A Group for intermediate/advanced photographers and a B Group for 'beginners'. Although each group have had a similar number of members, the A Group have recently provided the lion's share of competition images (35% of mostly B Group members did not enter competitions last year). Furthermore, the B Group has included members who are far from being 'beginners'.

A recent Survey Monkey poll of members sought to see whether the current two-division structure was still required. Twenty-eight members responded and of these, 55% wished to retain two competitive groups, 30% favoured having a competitive group and a non-competitive feedback only group with the remainder preferring to have a single group for competitions. However, breaking the responses down by the group of the respondent, it is clear that although A Group members are open to change, B

Group members favoured a two-group structure retaining an element of competition in both groups. Taking these findings into consideration the Committee has agreed to keep two competition groupings for the new season with some minor tweaks. Group A will be the main competition group open to all members who wish to have their images judged against those of other members. Group B will be a development group for members who feel they need to develop further before being judged alongside other more accomplished or confident members. Judges will be encouraged to tailor feedback accordingly. In addition, we will ask judges to identify the best of the images that are not held back (1st, 2nd, 3rd, HC, and C) with a near-miss 'merit' to add greater fidelity to the judges' feedback.

Members will need to identify their 'group' at the start of the season but will be permitted to move once in the year (the Committee may move members to the A Group if required, to allow B-Group members a fair chance to compete within the group). My priority is to support <u>all</u> members regardless of ability (enthusiasm is a given). We will monitor the changes and review next year.

The 2nd of our David's to introduce himself to the members, is David Hamilton:


My membership of Stroud Camera Club began in 2013 not long after I retired however my interest in photography began many years before when as a child my father showed me how to process a film then print contact prints. These magical moments made me an addict for life, processing my own black and white film and prints until the advent of digital!

My first camera was a roll film one using 127 film but eventually I was able to progress to better 35mm cameras and ended up on the Nikon system, where for better or worse I still am. I use a D7000 but still have my film cameras 2 Nikon FM's.

An exciting career in the Fire Service presented me with a host of fantastic photographic opportunities but frustratingly I was unable to do anything about it because the urgency of the incident gave me no time as a crew member or driver to take a picture.

What is ICM?

4 -

ICM stands for Intentional Camera Movement, it is a technique employed to creatively interpret a scene, as you are deliberately introducing a blur to the image. This technique is said to resemble that of the early 19th century impressionist artists.

The photographer will use a slower shutter speed and pan the camera to create an abstract impression of the subject. Subjects such as trees work well with vertical movement, water works well by following the flow of the tide. Essentially the technique provides the mechanism to capture the core and simplicity of the scenery. The viewer can often become overwhelmed as they witness many elements within the picture. Branches, tree trunks and leaves become too cluttered; ICM subtracts the chaotic nature of the scene and shifts the attention to its core. It's a means of simplification, of reductionism.

The combination of colour, movement and simplicity all help to form an overall feeling of a scene.

"Have you got GAS?"

Review by Richard Atkinson (R3) Peak Design Slide and Slide Lite

Cost (approx.): £60 (Slide) or £50 (Slide Lite)

I wouldn't have believed I could get excited about a camera <u>strap!</u>
That was before I discovered the Peak Design Slide and Slide Lite. These are two revolutionary camera straps by those innovative people at Peak Design. The Slide is for "full weight" camera and lens combinations – perfect for my Sony A9 with 100-400 zoom plus converter attached - and the Slide Lite is intended for compact cameras or mirrorless with a short lens. My personal recommendation for Club members would always be the Slide as it is suitable for all your likely choices of kit, however heavy or light.

The concept is simple in that it is designed to be worn traditionally around the neck, or bandolier-style, or just on the shoulder. For anyone concerned about carrying a heavy camera/lens combination it's perfect.



Wearing it bandolier-style spreads the weight across your shoulders with no pressure on your neck or back and allows you to swing the camera smoothly to the eye in one smooth movement. Special anchors come with the strap which you fix permanently (they remain removable though) to your camera and which allow you to instantly remove the strap if you want to put it on a tripod and don't want a strap dangling. Clever adjusters allow you to alter the length of the strap instantly while you're wearing it too.

It's a truly revolutionary piece of kit which I would now never be without. It's not cheap at around £60 including VAT which may seems a lot of money for a camera strap! Believe me, it's worth every penny. Here's a link to Peak Design's video but the best way to check it out is to ask me for a demo on one of our Summer Club outings – I ALWAYS have it on my camera. I wish I was on commission as I have "sold" four of these to friends and colleagues already. I'm not! Check out the video:

FUN FACT


Richard Atkinson – or R3
