Meet the members: David Hunt

David Hunt has kindly volunteered to be the first member to introduce himself:

I was born and bred in south London before moving around the country and now ending in a new house requiring little maintenance in Leonard Stanley. For medical reasons that turned out to be a very sensible move even though I loved living in the Forest of Dean.

I first started my interest in photography as a young kid with a Box Brownie. I soon moved up to my dad's old Ensign Selfix 20 folding camera – which I still have! Ah the disciplines of only having only 12 or 16 photos per roll of film, with the occasional double exposure when I forgot to roll on the film before taking the next photo! Progression was quick to the revolutionary Kodak Instamatic camera with the replaceable flash cubes. I dallied for a short while with a couple of Fuji 35mm cameras, which were the ones that really got me hooked on the wonders of photography.

I spent all my working life in the IT industry. Initially as a programmer before moving into a sales role. As luck would have it, I spent a couple of years as Account Manager for Kodak, supplying computer equipment for their R&D and Manufacturing sites at Harrow. My last 20 years of work was spent as an independent management practitioner to IT companies.

When I received my first big sales commission cheque I invested in my first SLR kit. I chose a Nikon FA with kit lens and a Tokina 200mm F2.8 lens, Nikon Flash etc. I have been a Nikon fan ever since.

Many cameras later, I recently invested in a D500, but have kept my D5300. My everyday lens is a Nikon 18-300 zoom (I got fed up having the wrong lens on my camera when a great photo opportunity presented itself, so I opted for a long zoom).



I have varied interests in photographic subjects, airshows, birds of prey, landscapes, macro shots of insects and, of course, my family.

For air shows and birds of prey I tend to use my Nikon 200-500 zoom, which is very heavy but takes great photos. During lockdown I have taken an interest in Macro with my Sigma 105mm macro lens.

Ironically, I first became aware of Stroud Camera Club when I was a member of the FoDCC. I had never been a member of any club before but thought I would give the Forest of Dean a try when I retired. At my first taster session, the speaker was Angela Rendell from Stroud CC. When I moved to Leonard Stanley I had no hesitation in joining Stroud CC. It was also Angela who encouraged me to enter salons; I started in April 2020. Since then, I have had over 130 acceptances, so I am well pleased with that.

So, thank you Angela and thank you to Stroud CC which is a very supportive and friendly club.

Question corner>>>

Q:How many megapixels do you need for prints?

Here's how you calculate the number of megapixels you'll need for a printed photograph:

Determine the physical size of your print, such as 4 x 6 inches or 8 x 10 inches. Then,
■ multiply the width by 300, and the height by 300, to give you the pixel count. That's
■ because 300 ppi — pixels per inch — is recommended for good-quality prints.
Therefore, an 8 x 10-inch print would be 2400 x 3000 pixels.

Then, multiply the width in pixels by the height in pixels: For that 8 x 10-inch print, it would be 2400 x 3000, which equals 7.2 million pixels. Divide the result from step 2 by 1 million, and you have the number of megapixels you need to make a good print. In this case, the minimum resolution your camera will need is 7.2 megapixels.

Review by Trish Peak Design Travel Tripod

Cost: £530 (Carbon) or £315 (Aluminium)

A significantly expensive travel tripod – but is it worth the money?

This tripod is a unique design, having no "dead space" when it is collapsed – Peak Design are known for their innovative products and this tripod which was designed by photographers for photographers has certainly had plenty of thought put into it.

This was a Kickstarter campaign which raised over \$12M and in my opinion it certainly ticks all the boxes. It is exceptionally light, incredibly easy to use – there is an integrated ball head, so only one knob to work out - can take a DSLR and has a maximum height of over 1.5 metres. With a removable centre column and screws that do not drop out this tripod appears to have built in practically everything a photographer might want from a travel tripod.



It can also easily convert to low profile and a mobile phone tripod with a few simple tweaks. It has a built-in hook for your camera bag to provide stabilization and certainly feels very sturdy for a travel tripod.

Negatives are the price – although the aluminium version is more budget friendly; and the fact that whilst it is a standard Arca plate you do always need a hex key with you as the mechanism to attach this to your camera is by hex key only. Peak Design do supply you with a hex key and this has a secure space attached to the tripod, but it would be a slight worry if it got lost.

Overall, I'd say this is definitely a 5-star tripod if you have the budget for it! Would I have bought one? Probably not at this price, but it is always worthwhile entering prize draws, as I was lucky enough to win mine at the Virtual Photography Show in 2020! And now I have it, I love it – and would love to think I would have bought it too!
