Jonathan Vaines - Composition

A new speaker was Jonathan Vaines who joined us via Zoom to lead us through the mystical art of composition – or as he said, "putting all the things in the right place to hold the viewer's attention." We were reminded about the "rule of thirds," the golden ratio, and the colour of thirds – with Jonathan telling us that our brains apparently work well with the Fibonacci theory.

Expanding upon these starting points, Jonathan took us on a complete tour of all things that make a composition – depth, height, isolation, balance and corners, leading lines, numbers, colour temperatures and depth of field. Showing us some super images to support his explanations, Jonathan certainly had the "evidence" that a lot of the "rules" of composition do engage the viewer.

Some of this we already knew, and some aspects were new. The use of symmetry in an image needing to be broken by light or a slight difference was an interesting concept. As were the ideas of using just the corners for a composition, including just bottom left and top right! Although we mostly know that odd numbers work well in our images, Jonathan also convinced us that even numbers can work, especially if they are used in pairs, such as 2 men with 2 pieces of art. An interesting evening of theory with some lovely images to support the ideas.

Martin Fry – Capturing the moment

1985 was apparently the first time that Martin spoke at Stroud Camera Club and with 34 members in attendance his preceding talks were obviously not duds! This evening proved to be anything but dud – murmurs of appreciation "wonderful", "tremendous", "superb" were heard at the end of each of his audio-visual presentations, and even the final piece which for some unknown reason lacked its soundtrack didn't diminish the quality of the evening.

Martin kept the majority of the evening local with beautiful landscapes inter-twined with AVs often accompanied by the wonderful songs of Jonny Coppin. A highlight for many was the soundtrack actually recorded by Martin some years ago of Laurie Lee reading his poem, and now skilfully blended into an enchanting photo-film.

From roof tiles to golden orbs, the creativity and skill with which Martin showcased his imagery was evident and thus not surprising that his AVs have collected many awards along the way.

The way that Martin is able to blend his images and set them perfectly to music or vocal was an exceptionally high standard and gave members plenty of inspiration. As Martin suggested – just get out there and capture the moment. Watch for the light and use it to help separate your all-important subject from the clutter of the background.

We are so lucky to have such beautiful landscapes on our doorstep, and if that is not your thing, then there is always the "Holly Auctions" in Tenbury Wells – yet another slight quirk of the unique area we live in.

Sheep and horses also featured in the evening, with Richard Atkinson expressing quite a fondness for sheep – to much hilarity within the room, Gary Canning and Jeff Wilson both using sheep as an excellent subject capture for the evening.

Flowers included tulips, dahlias, and clematis. Chris Organ showed a beautifully captured peach rose.

Several members had a humorous slant to their images which added to an overall fun evening. Well done to all who took part in an entertaining event.



In memoriam – David Hunt AFIAP – A tribute to a friend

David on 26th October. Jan, his wife, told me that he passed away peacefully in the Sue Ryder hospice at Leckhampton having fought heroically for many months with cancer and more than defving



the odds to

see not only Christmas 2022, but also Valentines, Easter, and the Summer of 2023.

David who was aged 71, was born in Stockwell, South London and spent most of his teenage years in Epsom, before moving to Hertfordshire then back to Surrey, then Slimbridge, the Forest of Dean and finally to Leonard Stanley. David joined Stroud Camera Club in 2019 he told me he was inspired to join having had a speaker whilst he was a member at FOD camera club who was a previous member at SCC. David grew up with an older brother, David Bowie as a neighbour and a love of singing - he was apparently an angelic choir boy!

David spent his working life in the IT industry, including a spell with Kodak – his progression through cameras he reported as including the "revolutionary Kodak Instamatic camera with the replaceable flash cubes" - I'm sure many members will relate to that! His passion for photography having started

We were very sad to hear of the passing of when he was young with a Box Brownie, he progressed to several Fuji 35mm cameras before a large commission cheque enabled him to fully indulge in his passion with the purchase of his first SLR kit. He chose a Nikon FA with kit lens and a Tokina 200mm F2.8 lens, and was a lifelong Nikon fan. Many cameras later, he invested in a Nikon D500, with an everyday lens - the Nikon 18-300 zoom – David told me that he "got fed up having the wrong lens on my camera when a great photo opportunity presented itself".

> David had many varied interests in photographic subjects; airshows, birds of prey, landscapes, macro shots of insects and, of course, his family. I think he will be very much remembered for his many beautiful Red Kite images, and also his super Red Arrows and his stunning "Taking the Air at RIAT" image, which I know earned him significant success on the FIAP Salon circuit.

> David was incredibly proud of his photographic achievement and was deservedly thrilled to achieve his AFIAP distinction in 2022, one of only a handful of members to have achieved the distinction at that time

> The camera club sends its sincere condolences to Jan, and David's daughters Georgina and Ros, he will be much missed at SCC.



His funeral was held in Cheltenham on 14th November with 6 club members present to pay their respects. RIP David.


The evening started with a slide show from the PAGB of some of the high scores of the 2023 GB Cup.


