### **WCPF Travelling Print Exhibition**

First week back of the new season – about 30 degrees in the Club room – and a hot selection of images to share. 26 members and selection of 12 prints.

The standards were of course high as this is a Federation level not an easy task with so much quality on offer. Images across Ultimately members selected 2 beautiful nature images as the exposures, sharp in the right places and no distractions being key points, plus good use of compositional techniques and with both being excellent behavioural images.

A highlight of course is the point at which the "Awarded" images project and thus many congratulations must go to Richard Atkinson and Leslie Holmes for both achieving salon gold medals in the "Nature" section. Richard's well captured starlings squabbling, and Leslie's tragic nature kill scene (which also made the *front cover of the salon brochure!)*

## Members' Night >>> Still Life & Macro

Our first members' evening showcased images on the theme of still life and/or macro. Plenty of members brought in their USB sticks to share their interpretation of the subject.

Images ranged from close-ups of flies (including on dung!) through to moths, dragonflies, damsel flies, spiders and flying bees, Roger gave a good insight into how images can be stacked easily using Affinity. Paul Martin and René Cason both use in-camera stacking with their Olympus cameras, although Paul also commented that he uses Helicon and Photoshop as options.

It was good to see some still life within the mix as well. Annie didn't disappoint with her well seen and executed captures, including some well-presented rust; Brian Dinnage's melted chocolate was an inspired piece of work - but we were concerned when he won the chocolate

biscuits in the raffle! Gary Canning used full scale for his still life, and came up with some very well thought out images - including a shop front which as he told us was here today and gone tomorrow – and a Gormley statue on top of a building in Oxford with an exquisite use of negative space to really pull us in to the image and look up!

A thoroughly enjoyable opening member evening. Get prepared for the next one very soon!

### RULES, RULES, blah, blah, blah – but yes important!

With the new Club competition season having started and lots of "chatter" about Artificial Intelligence it is probably a suitable time to remind you of some of the main rules and guidance within our club.

Importantly, as we use images from our monthly competitions for our entries to the Federation (WCPF) competitions, we do also need to abide by their rules as well as setting our own.

Our rules are fully laid out, including an extensive preliminary guidance section about use of AI on our website. If you go into the "Club" tab, you will find a document on the right-hand side entitled:

> Stroud Camera Club Competitions - Terms and Conditions - Amended August 2023

As a basic overview remember that all images must have been taken by the entrant. All image manipulation processes and techniques are eligible (unless otherwise stated eg. For nature, and use of AI) provided that:

- i. All images originate from a photographic process and not computer-generated graphics.
- ii. No elements or material from other sources such as royalty-free material and clipart are allowed.
- iii. entrants own the copyright to every element of their submissions.
- h) If a person and or property are included within an image, the photographer accepts responsibility for ensuring that any necessary permission has been obtained.

#### What does this all mean?

In practice, the most important thing is your personal integrity.

Plus understanding what is **not** owned by you, and often this is where there is some misunderstanding.

As an example, a 1 - 5 pixel straight "stroke line" around an image created by the computer is acceptable. However, a "frame" or "border" created by a programme such as DXO/Nik, Topaz, Snapseed, Luminar, Photoshop etc is not acceptable. Someone else has created that New Members border - not you. Of course, there is nothing to stop you creating your own decorative border and using it as an overlay.

The same applies to textures; if you have photographed the texture yourself, you can of course use it over your image however you wish. If, however, it is a texture provided within a software programme such as Topaz, Luminar, Snapseed, Nik, Photoshop etc then you cannot enter this into a club competition.

Creative brushes are another area where caution must be applied. If you are using any brush other than the standard round brush to actually add an element to your image eg. Splatter, or grass, or clouds, then this brush must have been created by you – you cannot use the brushes (or actions that create such effects) if you have not created this all yourself.

Sorry to "harp on" we just do not ever want to fall foul of Federation rules and be disqualified – we are reliant upon YOU and YOUR INTEGRITY.

### **Small Reminder about image sizes**

### 1) Competition

Just a quick reminder that competition images need to be sized at max 1600px wide x max1200px tall. You can go to any size within these parameters. Please upload to the correct section you are entering – either print or digital. Read the instructions.

### 2) Club nights

Again, images ideally sized at 1600px wide x 1200px tall.

### 3) Galleries

If you post to any of the Club galleries via the website these are limited to 800px wide x 800px tall. This is a restriction set by the website not us. Richard is trying to get this changed, but it is all about storage capacity.

Within the sizes above you can have any size you want. So as an example, an image of 1060 x 1200 would be perfectly fine for a competition. Etc.
