Although Covid numbers appear to be alarmingly high (statistics can be presented in many ways, few of which tell the complete story), I remain confident that SCC Club Nights can continue without exposing members to unacceptable risk provided members remain fully vaccinated (including boosters when offered) and stay at home if symptomatic with any respiratory infection. The numbers attending Club Nights is heartening to see and helps maintain the sense of community that is essential in a thriving camera club. Apart from the well-attended Club Nights, I am delighted that 'Back to Basics' has returned to its core function of supporting members to acquire new skills. The small group format appears to work well for those who have attended the two events held so far and we will continue to identify topics that address members' needs - especially those new to the Club. Although not all members have Lightroom or Photoshop, I am a firm believer in thinking that post-production is an integral part of the image generation process and getting the best out of your photographic endeavours. Both programmes have recently launched some exciting upgrades with many features accessible on mobile devices (tablet and phone). If you do not currently post-process your images, I would encourage you to explore what is available online (LR, PS, Affinity, Luminar, Snapseed, etc.) - never has so much power been available to amateur photographers.

The review >>> "In the footsteps of Shackleton" Eddy Lane ARPS DPAGB EFIAP

Eddy Lane is one of our many well-respected photographers, who is also hugely involved at regional level with the WCPF organising the Kingswood Salver and the Knightshayes Trophy. So, we knew we were in for a treat. His illustrated talk was a mine of interesting information and beautiful scenery – roughly tracing the path of the ill-fated trip of Sir Ernest Shackleton at the start of the last century from The Falklands to South Georgia and on to the Antarctic. The snippets of history that were included to "set the scene" were fascinating, and the AV shown after the break (sorry about the sound) using Frank Hurley's actual photographs from the trip was amazing. It really is incredible to think that something that seems as long ago as that expedition was, could have been documented so well with the rudimentary camera of the time. I think we all resonated with the wish of Hurley to make sure that the film plates were saved, but what a difference we've seen in a hundred years – no longer heavy glass plates would need rescuing, simply just the tiny SD Cards of today!

Eddy showed both his own and Pam's photography demonstrating their love of wildlife as well as travel. They are both incredibly knowledgeable about their subjects, and if SCC members do not know their Gentoo from their Chinstrap or Adele, then they were definitely not concentrating!

Scott presented a selection of his own AVs, which were all extremely high quality and gave us an insight into his methods as well as reasons for calling them "Photo-films" – simply put, they are photographs made into films. His beautiful speaking voice only adds to the professionalism of his films, which included a selection of the local area, his other travels and a beautifully illustrated film of individual "haiku-type" poems.

After the break Scott presented various films that had been submitted by members, these included a serene presentation from Paul Edwards, amusing travelogue from Ian Peters, Roger and his dog Izzy's Thames path walk, Richard Atkinson's Magnificent men in their flying machines and Andy Harbin's wonderful photographs in his film "Mountains and things" (understated as usual from Andy!). Adobe have released major updates to Photoshop and Lightroom which include new neural filters and some enhanced AI select subject and masking tools. These tools also feature in Adobe Camera RAW (ACR).

If you have a Creative Cloud subscription and haven't yet updated take a look now. Don't forget you can retain your previous version if you are concerned at all, and that you can also revert to a previous version should you want to at a later stage.




