Roger's Report

Support has been excellent and I would like to thank all our members for staying with the Club throughout the pandemic and providing the foundation to recover stronger than ever. We continue to attract new members and I am confident that our best days lie ahead. We have already had a members' night, an excellent external speaker and our first open competition - on each occasion there has been a palpable buzz around the room and it has been great to see members engaging with each other again discussing their shared interest in photography.

We all have different ways of learning and our varied programme aims to provide a variety of ways for you to learn new skills and develop your art whether through seeking inspiration from others or critical feedback on images submitted for competition. While I thoroughly enjoy the invited speakers, and often marvel at what can be achieved with a camera, a dash of patience and a bucket load of skill, I have learnt more from critical review of competition images than anything else. Brian Swinyard did not disappoint with his appraisal of images in our first competition and I hope the expanded scoring system with an additional near-miss (Merit) category helped identify the strengths in some images where members might previously have missed out on gaining the recognition they deserved. Unfortunately, there were too few B Group images to run a

separate competition on this occasion, but it is our intention to provide separate feedback to our foundation level members when numbers permit - with a number of new members, some of whom are starting out on their photographic journeys, we should be able to do so.

Back to Basics is another benefit for the Club, but over recent years lost its focus on supporting members gain new skills. Targeted sessions aimed at introducing members to new techniques and skills in smaller groups should address this and Trish made an excellent start with an introduction to Lightroom for members new to postprocessing. In future we will be looking at printing, Photoshop layers and off-camera flash. If there is something that you would like covered, speak to myself or Trish and we can see if we have an expert among our ranks who can run a session. Similarly, as our attention starts to drift toward planning next year's programme, it would be great if you identify topics or activities that you think may be of interest to members. Finally, if you have capacity and would like to contribute more to the running of the Club, please let me know and an 'opportunity' will be found.

Our "demonstration stations" gave members a chance to talk to other members and look at various new bits of kit that fellow members recommend. Gerry had the room jumping with his various balloons and party poppers being captured via remote flash and various other demos ranged from new camera bodies, through software (Snapseed) to examples of salon successes.

I retired on the Thursday of our first Open competition in September which followed 42 years with Renishaw in a product Marketing role. I started as an electronics technician following an engineering apprenticeship at Mawdsley's in Dursley. This eventually evolved into a technical product marketing role which took me to many faroff destinations, including, Japan, China, Taiwan, Korea and Brazil to name but a few. During that time I made many friends abroad and enjoyed many memorable trips to some amazing places. If only I'd been a photographer then!

Before lockdown the only camera I owned was my trusty iPhone which whilst being used as a camera often, was not something I considered to be a hobby. In the April after lockdown began, I bought a Micro Four Thirds Panasonic G85 second hand. This came with the 12-60mm Lumix kit lens. I soon discovered that I really enjoyed using it and before long I had acquired an Olympus 60mm macro and a 9-18mm Olympus W/A lens both from the secondhand dealer MPB. This has evolved even more with some upgrades in the lead up to retirement. (If I can't afford to treat myself now, then when will I?)


So, after some excellent advice from Paul Martin, I have traded in my Panasonic G91 for a new Olympus OMD E 1 Mk iii and at the same time traded the Lumix 12-60mm for the Olympus 12-100mm Pro lens. The OMD camera is a supercomputer in a small black box, so it's going to take a long time before I fully understand all the feedback we receive for our images from amazing technology that it has.

Then there is post-production, which is another huge subject that needs knowledge and understanding. So far, I do almost everything in Lightroom and hope to progress as time goes by.

In the time since April 2020, I have been extremely grateful for all the help and advice that I have received from the more experienced members of the club. This has led me to a few decent

performances in club competitions in the B section, and this, in turn, gave me the confidence to have a go in a few Salons. I have been lucky enough to achieve 19 acceptances to date and this is after I set myself a personal target of getting one acceptance in 2021! These come from many countries including the likes of Argentina, Albania, Italy, Guatemala, Kenya, Australia, China and the UK. It's a great feeling when something gets accepted and now the target has moved on to getting something more.

Whilst I recognise I have a long way to go, I have to say that the best way to improve is to talk to others and enter competitions. The external judges is invaluable in helping you improve and understand what is required to make a memorable image.




